THE LITUGY OF LENT

Lent is a season of solemn, penitential (repentant) reflection of our sin and the suffering of our Lord Jesus Christ for our salvation. In Lent, we put away the *Alleluia* verse, the *Gloria in Excelsis*, and the *Gospel procession* until the Easter Vigil. These changes reflect the solemn, penitential character of the season and aid our Lenten reflection. We will also use Divine Service Setting Four throughout Lent to aid us in our Lenten observance.

LENTEN DISCIPLINES

The Gospel reading for Ash Wednesday is Mt. 6:1-6, 16-21, where the Lord speaks of three disciplines of the Christian life: prayer, fasting and giving alms. Jesus commands that we practice these things in secret, because they are not for the praise of men, but for training in righteousness. Lent is a time of increased prayer, fasting (giving up food for a time, such as a meal a day) and almsgiving (donations to the poor and impoverished of the world).

Consider a personal plan for fasting. Normally, fasting is the setting aside of one meal per day, to devote the hour you would normally be eating to prayer. For your prayers, we have a devotion in the narthex called "Jesus Deliver Us: Set Us Free" for your use at home. I also have a chart to pray the whole Psalter (Book of Psalms) during the forty days of Lent in this month's newsletter. For alms, consider a donation to some local or national charity.

Our Lenten disciplines are not done to merit some kind of righteousness before God. We do not pray, fast, or give alms to save ourselves. We trust and believe that we are already righteous and saved in Jesus. However, these disciplines are an aid to us because they remind us to entrust ourselves and our possessions to Jesus, who gave all he had for our life and salvation. Consider also making use of Individual Confession and Absolution with Pr. Yeager, 6:30-7:30am Sunday mornings in his office.

Midweek Lenten Services are at 7pm with a supper before hosted by the various groups and families the congregation. The theme of this Midweek Lenten series is "The Apostles' Creed." We will consider who our God is and what he has done for us: the God who created us, the God who redeemed us in Christ by his holy precious blood, the God who sanctifies us in the water of Baptism that we may be his own and live in his kingdom forever.

Ash Wednesday marks the beginning of the holy season of Lent. The Imposition of Ashes has its foundation in the ritual observances of Old Testament Israel. When the people would gather before God to repent of their sin, they would humble themselves with sackcloth and ashes [Jer. 6:26].

Tonight, as we come before God in repentance, mourning and lamenting our sin and the destruction that sin has wrought in the world and in our lives, we take the palm branches used in last year's Palm Sunday procession, which have been burned to ashes, trace the Sign of the Holy Cross traced upon our foreheads, while hearing the words God spoke to Adam after the Fall: "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return" [Gen. 3:19].

Just as the people of Israel marked their doors at the first Passover with the blood of the Lamb, shielding them from the angel of death, the ash on our foreheads tonight is marked in the shape of a cross, reminding us of the Lamb of God who has saved us by his blood and marked us in Holy Baptism as his own, that we might not taste death but live with him forever. We repent in view of the Lamb that was slain, trusting and firmly believing that in his blood we have forgiveness and life.
