













Salutation and Collect of the Day



Holy Gospel *Luke 24:13–35*

P The Holy Gospel according to St. Luke, the twenty-fourth chapter.



¹³That very day two of them were going to a village named Emmaus, about seven miles from Jerusalem, ¹⁴ and they were talking with each other about all these things that had happened. ¹⁵While they were talking and discussing together, Jesus himself drew near and went with them. ¹⁶But their eyes were kept from recognizing him. ¹⁷And he said to them, "What is this conversation that you are holding with each other as you walk?" And they stood still, looking sad. ¹⁸Then one of them, named Cleopas, answered him, "Are you the only visitor to Jerusalem who does not know the things that have happened there in these days?" ¹⁹And he said to them, "What things?" And they said to him, "Concerning Jesus of Nazareth, a man who was a prophet mighty in deed and word before God and all the people, ²⁰ and how our chief priests and rulers delivered him up to be condemned to death, and crucified him. ²¹But we had hoped that he was the one to redeem Israel. Yes, and besides all this, it is now the third day since these things happened. ²²Moreover, some women of our company amazed us. They were at the tomb early in the morning, ²³ and when they did not find his body, they came back saying that they had even seen a vision of angels, who said that he was alive. ²⁴Some of those who were with us went to the tomb and found it just as the women had said, but him they did not see." ²⁵And he said to them, "O foolish ones, and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets have spoken! ²⁶Was it not necessary that the Christ should suffer these things and enter into his glory?" ²⁷And beginning with Moses and all the Prophets, he interpreted to them in all the Scriptures the things concerning himself.

²⁸So they drew near to the village to which they were going. He acted as if he were going farther, ²⁹but they urged him strongly, saying, "Stay with us, for it is toward evening and the day is now far spent." And He will come again with glory to judge both the living and the dead, whose kingdom will have no end.


And I believe in the Holy Spirit,





The Third Sunday of Easter | Luke 24:13-35

It is Easter evening. Two disciples are walking from Jerusalem to Emmaus, about a seven mile journey. As they are walking, they are discussing together the events of the past week—the arrest, the trial, the crucifixion, the burial of Jesus. And then, just earlier that day, the odd news from the women of the open, empty tomb. Stories of angels there. The report of Peter and John that, upon entering the tomb, the shroud which wrapped the Lord's dead body lied neatly folded—but the body of Jesus was nowhere to be found.

They had staked their lives on Jesus of Nazareth. They thought he was the One who would redeem Israel. He made the blind to see, the deaf to hear and the mute to speak. He raised the dead. They hoped he was the Messiah. And in that short week, their hopes seemed to have been dashed to pieces. Disappointment, disillusion, grief, bewilderment, confusion, sadness. What words can describe what goes through your mind as you walk that lonely Emmaus road? You trusted Jesus and now he seems to have disappeared without a trace. You feel betrayed—used maybe, certainly sad. Rumors don't provide any comfort. Even reports of a vision of angels rings hollow. It all hangs on that little sentence, "But him they did not see." [Lk. 24:24]

As they walked the Emmaus road, a stranger caught up with them. It was Jesus, but their eyes were kept from recognizing him. What does this mean? One: the risen body of Jesus was the same body he had in his earthly life—still bearing in his hands and his feet and side the marks of nails and spear, as we heard last week. But somehow, that body was different—transformed, we might say. So that Mary Magdalene didn't recognize him at first Easter morning. She supposed the risen Jesus to be the tomb's gardener. These two Emmaus disciples suppose him to be no one but a common stranger.

But it was also that Jesus was purposely concealing himself from them. First, he wanted to hear from them what they thought about him. "We thought he was the one," they said—but this only betrays that they do not yet take Jesus at his word. Jesus had told them three times that he would die and in three days, rise. They should've expected this. What happened on Holy Week is exactly what the Lord said would happen. But still, they did not believe.

"O foolish men and slow of heart to believe all that the prophets had spoken!" What does he mean? Jesus is teaching the disciples how to interpret the Bible. The Bible is not a rulebook or an owner's manual for life. The Scriptures are centered in Christ and bear witness—in every page—to his death and resurrection. Jesus could've given them a Bible study on the Passover, the Exodus, the sacrifices, Isaiah's suffering servant, and all the images and stories which are really pictures of the One Central Story—the Lord's Passover from death to life. All Scripture is centered in Jesus and finds its ultimate goal and fulfillment in his death and resurrection.

"Were not our hearts burning within us when he opened to us the Scriptures?" the disciples asked themselves later. As Jesus unfolded Holy Scripture to show them how his suffering and death were no accident, but Scripture-fulfillment, all of the pieces were coming together, forming a picture of crystal clarity in their minds. They came to understand that Holy Week was no tragic accident. Holy Week was the playing-out of God's definite plan of salvation for mankind. Jesus' suffering and death was pre-planned from the foundation of the world, so that men might be saved through the blood of Jesus. His death was no defeat, but really victory.

They still don't recognize Jesus. They arrive at the Emmaus house later in the evening. "Stay with us, for it is toward evening, and the day is far spent," the disciples asks the Lord. So the Lord joins them in the house. And then, he stops being their guest and starts being their Host. He takes bread, gives thanks, breaks it, and gives it to them—echoes of the Upper Room the week before—the Passover meal, the breaking of the bread, "This is my Body." At that very moment, at the breaking of the bread, their eyes were finally opened. They recognized Jesus. Just as suddenly, he disappears from sight.

What does it all mean? The Lord is teaching us that now, we will know him in a new way. In our earthly life, we will not know him like Thomas, or Mary Magdalene in the garden—by touch and by sight. "We walk by faith, not by sight," says St. Paul, 2 Cor. 5:7. "Blessed are those who haven't seen, and yet believe," Jesus said to Thomas, Jn. 20:29. Now we will know the Lord in a new way—through the opening up of the Scriptures, and the breaking of the bread—what we Lutherans call "Word and Sacrament."

These are the places where the Lord Jesus connects with us, unites himself to us, and distributes to us the gifts he won for us on the cross—forgiveness, life, and salvation—and we receive him there in faith. In Christian worship, we hear from Christ in the Scriptures. We receive him in the Supper. And that's what the story of the Emmaus Road teaches: in this in-between time—the time in-between his Ascension and his coming again on the Last Day—is not a time for seeing with our eyes, but hearing with our ears, and receiving with our mouths the Body and the Blood. The Lord is made known to us through these means, and there, like the two disciples, we see him by faith. And even more, we are renewed by these means to wait for his Second Coming in hope, when what is hidden will be revealed, when seeing by faith will give way to seeing with our own eyes, and like Thomas and Mary and all the disciples who saw and touched the risen Christ, we will see and behold him too in the glory of his eternal resurrection.

We look forward to the day when we can celebrate with our students with the Rite of Confirmation and receive the Sacrament together with them.

Elders, Council, and Voters were scheduled to meet April 20-21. Due to restrictions, these meetings have been tentatively rescheduled to May 18-19.
