Today, the glory of God is revealed through a star that leads the magi to Israel. The magi are astrologers from a far off land, perhaps sorcerers who practiced magic and divination- certainly not those whom you'd expect to fall down before the new-born Lord and worship him with expensive gifts. But Christmas is all about God choosing the weak and foolish things of the world to shame the wise, and humbling the proud, casting the mighty from their thrones, and exalting the lowly. We rejoice because we too are those who were far off from God through sin. But we have been brought near to God through the blood of Christ to worship him in spirit and in truth.

- +It is not necessary to stand for the final doxological stanza of <u>Distribution Hymns</u>.

# On the Sign of the Cross

The <u>Sign of the Cross</u> is a good practice for the Christian. When we make the Sign of the Cross over ourselves, we remember our Baptism, the place we were sealed with the Name of the Triune God and given the gifts of the Holy Cross: forgiveness, life, and salvation. In the Small Catechism, Martin Luther encourages all Christians to make the Sign of the Cross each morning and evening, at the Invocation.

In the Divine Service, it is appropriate to make the Sign of the Cross at the Invocation; at the Absolution; at the close of the Nicene Creed; at the Pax Domini; when the pastor blesses each table at the Distribution; and at the Benediction. A good rule of thumb is, whenever you see the pastor make the Sign of the Cross toward the congregation, or whenever the pastor makes the Sign over himself, that is a good time to make the Sign of the Cross. Of course, in the freedom of the Gospel, we are free to make or not to make the Sign of the Cross without burdening our conscience.

Making the Sign of the Cross does not make us superior Christians. It simply serves to remind us of Christ who claimed us as his own when we were baptized.
